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# ORTHODOX WORD OF THE WEEK

Antimins - (Gr: Antimension meaning "instead of the table") is among the most important furnishings of the altar in Orthodox Christian liturgical traditions. It is a rectangular piece of cloth, of either linen or silk, typically decorated with representations of the entombment of Christ, the four Evangelists, and scriptural passages related to the Eucharist [Holy Communion]. A small relic of a martyr is sewn into it [ours is from Saint Euphemia]. The Eucharist cannot be celebrated without an antimins... The antimins is consecrated and signed by our bishop. #### SUNDAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS

#### **Epistle:** Hebrews 4:14-5:6

# **Jesus the Great High Priest**

<sup>14</sup> Since then we have a great high priest who has passed through the heavens, Jesus, the Son of God, let us hold fast our confession. <sup>15</sup> For we have not a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who in every respect has been tempted as we are, yet without sin. <sup>16</sup> Let us then with confidence draw near to the throne of grace, that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need.

5 For every high priest chosen from among men is appointed to act on behalf of men in relation to God, to offer gifts and sacrifices for sins. <sup>2</sup>He can deal gently with the ignorant and wayward, since he himself is beset with weakness. <sup>3</sup> Because of this he is bound to offer sacrifice for his own sins as well as for those of the people. <sup>4</sup> And one does not take the honor upon himself, but he is called by God, just as Aaron was.

<sup>34</sup> And he called to him the multitude with his disciples, and said to them, "If any man would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. 35 For whoever would save his life will lose it; and whoever loses his life for my sake and the gospel's will save it. <sup>36</sup> For what does it profit a man, to gain the whole world and forfeit his life? <sup>37</sup> For what can a man give in return for his life? 38 For whoever is ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of him will the Son of man also be ashamed, when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels." 9 And he said to them, "Truly, I say to you, there are some standing here who will not taste death before they see that the kingdom of God has come with power."

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#### LIVES OF THE SAINTS

#### The Czestochowa Icon Of The Mother Of God

Commemorated on March 19/6

We have this icon for veneration. It has the silver cover to it.



The Chenstokhovsk (Czestochowa) Icol of the Mother of God, by tradition, i regarded as among the 70 icons of th done by the holy Evangelist Luk (Comm. 18 October). It was written a Jerusalem, in the Mount Zion section (where it was that the Last Suppe

occurred in the Cenacle, or common dining room). In the years 66-67, during the time of the assault on Jerusalen by Roman forces under the leadership of Vespasian and Titus, the Christians fled Jerusalem, going to the localof Pella. Together with other holy things, they preserved in caves also the Chenstokhovsk Image of the Mother o God. In the year 326, when the holy Empress Helei went about through Jerusalem for veneration at the holy places and found the Cross of the Lord, she received also this icon as a gift from Christians, which she conveyed to Constantinople and placed in a court chapel, where i remained over the course of five centuries.


The wonderworking image was brought to Russia witl great reverence by the founder of the city of L'vo (Lemberg – 1268-1270), the Galitsko-Volynsk princ Lev Danilovich, and it was placed in the Bel'zsk castle under the supervision of Orthodox clergy.

Later on, during the conquest of Western Ukraine by the Polish, the wonderworking icon came into the possession of the Polish governor prince Vladisla Opol'skii. The Tatars (Mongols), bursting in upon the expanse of Russia, and set siege to the Bel'zsk castle Hoping on the help of the Mother of God, prince Vladislav brought out the venerable icon from churcl and installed it upon the city wall. Pierced by an enem arrow, the wonderworking image preserved hencefortly traces of a trickle of blood. A pernicious mist then falling upon the Tatar forces compelled them to lift their sieg of the castle and withdraw to their own territories. The Heavenly Mediatrix in a dream vision commanded the prince to transfer the wonderworking icon to the Chenstokhovsk Mount Yasna. The monastery on Moun Yasna – (the Mount of "Witnessing" – as they termed i from the many miracles happening there), was founded in 1352. Prince Vladislav conveyed thither the sacred image and entrusted it into the care of monks of the Paulinian Order. Some years later, ruffians plundered the monastery. Having looted it of all its valuables, they wanted to snatch also the wonderworking image, but an invisible force held back the horses, and the sleigh-cart with the icon would not budge from the spot. In a rage one of the robbers flung down the holy icon upon the ground, and another struck at it on the face. Herewith a proper punishment befell all: the first burst into pieces, the hand of the second withered off, and the others either fell down dead or were struck blind.

In the mid XVII Century the Swedish king Charles X Gustavus, having captured Warsaw and Cracow (Krakov), suffered a blow beneathe the Chenstokhovsk monastery at Mount Yasna. The help and intercession of the Heavenly Queen gave courage to the Polish, and king Jan Cazimir, returning to L'vov, promulgated a declaration, in which he entrusted his realm to the protection of the Mother of God, calling Her Chenstokhovsk Image the "Polish Queen". The war with the Swedes ended successfully for the Polish in the year 1656.

The many miracles from the Chestokhovsk Wonderworking Image were recorded in a special book, kept in the church of the Chenstokhovsk monastery. Many a copy was made from this icon, both for Catholic and also for Orthodox churches.

In the year 1813, the wonderworking image was transferred to Saint Peterburg and placed in the Kazan cathedral.



# THE PRAYER OF SAINT EPHRAIM THE SYRIAN

(in the Ruthenian tradition as found in St. Peter Mogila's 1639 Liturgikon (Sluzhebnik)

O Lord and Master of my life, take from me the spirit of laziness, despair, lust for power, and vain talking. + [Prostration]

But give to me, Your servant, the spirit of purity, humility, patience, and love. + [Prostration]

Yes, Lord and King, grant me to see my own sins, and not judge my brother, for blessed are You forever and ever. Amen. + [Prostration]

The following triplet is recited 4 times (making a total of 12 bows):

O God, be merciful to me, a sinner. [bow]
O God, cleanse me of my sins and have mercy on me. [bow]

O Lord, forgive me, for my sins are many. [bow]

Then the prayer again with only one prostration:

O Lord and Master of my life, take from me the spirit of laziness, despair, lust for power, and vain talking. But give to me, Your servant, the spirit of purity, humility, patience, and love. Yes, Lord and King, grant me to see my own sins, and not judge my brother, for blessed are You forever and ever. Amen. + [Prostration]

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# The Jesus Prayer

(Inhale) O Lord, Jesus Christ, Son of God, (Exhale) have mercy on me, a sinner!

(Repeat until your heart is calm...)

# A Prayer Of Repentance (Psalm 50/51)

Have mercy upon me, O God, according to Your great mercy; And according to the multitude of Your compassions, blot out my transgressions. Wash me thoroughly from my iniquity, And cleanse me from my sin. For I acknowledge my iniquity, And my sin is continually before me. Against You only have I sinned, And done this evil before You. That You might be justified in Your words, And prevail when You judge. For behold, I was conceived in iniquities, And in sins did my mother bear me.

For behold, You have loved truth; The hidden and secret things of Your wisdom You have made clear to me. You shall sprinkle me with hyssop, and I shall be made clean; You shall wash me and I shall be made whiter than snow. You shall make me to hear joy and gladness, The bones which have been humbled shall rejoice. Turn Your face away from my sins, And blot out all my iniquities.

Create a clean heart in me, O God, And renew a right spirit within me. Cast me not away from Your presence, And take not Your Holy Spirit from me. Restore to me the joy of Your salvation, And with Your governing Spirit establish me. I shall teach transgressors Your ways, And the ungodly shall turn back to You.

Deliver me from blood-guiltiness, O God, who are the God of my salvation, My tongue shall rejoice in Your righteousness. O Lord, You shall open my lips, And my mouth shall declare Your praise.

For if You had desired sacrifice, I would have given it; With whole burnt offerings You shall not be pleased. A sacrifice to God is a broken spirit, A heart that is broken and humbled God will not despise. Do good, O Lord, in Your good pleasure to Zion; And let the walls of Jerusalem be built Then shall You be pleased with a sacrifice of righteousness, with oblation and whole burnt offerings; Then shall they offer bullocks upon Your altar.

How and When to Make the Sign of the Cross
The Cross is perhaps the most well-known symbol
in all of Christendom. Even non-Christians
recognize it. And we all understand and agree on
what the Cross means (on the surface, at least).
But the way Christians make the sign of the Cross
differs depending on which Christian community
you encounter. So, in this post, we explain
specifically how and when Christians in the
Orthodox Church make the sign of the Cross.

#### A SYMBOL OF VICTORY

As the instrument Christ chose to bring about His evermemorable and life-creating death, the Cross holds a special place in the heart of every Orthodox Christian. We understand that this symbol, once a primitive means of torture and capital punishment, now reminds us of Christ's victory over death. Orthodox Christians make the sign of the Cross because it affirms what we believe about Christ as the Incarnate Son of God and all that He did for us. It is an outward manifestation that illustrates our view of God in Trinity (Father, Son, and Holy Spirit) and our belief in the two natures of Christ (fully God and fully Man). It is, in essence, a physical form of prayer.

Because of our love for the sign of the Cross, the Orthodox use it daily. Not only do we use it during worship, but also before and after meals, during personal prayer, and in moments of worry or need. The saints, and Christ Himself, make this sign in holy icons. We love the cross perhaps just as much as we love the Theotokos, if not more. Because Christ used it to bring about our salvation. To show our love and devotion to Christ, during any given service or

liturgy, the faithful may cross themselves close to one-hundred times!

#### HOW TO MAKE THE SIGN

If you've ever come to an Orthodox service and looked around, you probably saw someone crossing themselves at some point. To newcomers and inquirers, this can be a bit strange, since we cross ourselves differently than other Christians. Let's walk through the Orthodox way of making the sign of the cross, step by step.

How to Make the Sign of the Cross

- 1. Join the thumb, index, and middle fingers of your right hand.
- 2. Rest the other two fingers of your right hand down against your palm.
- 3. Take that hand and touch your joined fingertips to your forehead.

Let your fingers rest there for a moment.

4. Then bring your fingertips down to your abdomen.

Again, let your fingers rest here a moment. Some people bring their fingers only as far as the chest, while others reach down to their navel. Either of these is acceptable.

- 5. Move your fingertips to touch the front of your right shoulder.
- 6. Finally, touch your fingertips to the front of your left shoulder.

Note a couple differences between the Orthodox sign and that of Roman Catholics and Protestants. First, Roman Catholics cross themselves from left to right and typically keep all five fingers straight. Secondly, Protestant practice in making the sign of the cross, much like Protestantism itself, varies. Protestantism does not prohibit it, but they do not necessarily encourage it either, because there is no Biblical command to use the sign of the cross.

#### VARIATIONS OF THE SIGN

You may also have noticed some people make the sign three times in a row, while others only do it once. Some make large sweeping motions, while others keep things simple and small. All these variations! But, which way is the *right* way?

Put simply, there isn't one. Crossing yourself is not an issue of dogma (belief necessary for salvation) in Orthodoxy. Instead, it is a matter of personal piety. In other words, aside from the arrangement of the fingers and direction of the movement, all else is up to you. If you feel moved to always make the sign of the cross in three's, you may do so. If you wish to venerate icons in a slightly different manner than another parishioner, you can. Each Orthodox Christian can express his or her faith in whatever physical ways they feel necessary, as long as they do so out of love for God. (If you do things instead to bring attention to yourself and feed your pride, you should reflect upon that.)

#### WHEN TO MAKE THE SIGN OF THE CROSS

Because crossing yourself is an issue of personal piety, the Orthodox do not have strict guidelines about when you should and should not cross yourself. In the Orthodox tradition, we cross ourselves on many occasions. Below is a list of times when you *should* cross yourself:

- · Whenever the priest, chanter, reader, or choir invokes or alludes to the name of the Holy Trinity
- $\cdot$  At the beginning and/or end of personal (and communal) prayer
- · Upon entering and leaving the church
- $\cdot$  When venerating holy icons, relics, the cross, or the Gospel
- · Before receiving Communion\*
- · Whenever you pass in front of the Holy Altar, whether the doors are open or closed

This is by no means an exhaustive list! We cross ourselves many other times as well. Again, it all comes down to personal choice. If the Holy Spirit moves you to express your piety in a particular way, no one will judge you or look at you strangely for it.

#### WHEN NOT TO MAKE THE SIGN OF THE CROSS

Though the Orthodox make the sign of the cross rather liberally, there are a couple times when we should not make the sign of the cross during services:

- · At the chalice before or after taking Holy Communion\*
- · Whenever a bishop or priest blesses the congregation with his hand and says, "Peace be to

all." Here, we merely give a slight bow and receive the blessing.

#### CONCLUSION

In summary, the Orthodox cross themselves the way Christians have for millennia. Additionally, we have guidelines for when we should and should not crossourselves during worship. However, we don't force them on anyone who decides to come and worship with us. If you aren't Orthodox and do visit a loca parish, please don't feel as if you must make the sign of the cross. We make the sign out of love for God, a a way of expressing with our bodies our faith in Him You need not make the sign until you, too, feel sucle conviction.

\*Notice we mentioned Communion in both lists. Here's why! If you cross yourself too close to the chalice, you might hit the chalice with your hand, o cause some of the Body and Blood of Christ to spill However, it is okay for you to cross yourself before approaching the chalice and after backing away to receive blessed bread.

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# SUGGESTED GUIDELINES FOR THE GREAT FAST (GREAT LENT):

We are called to increase our *Prayer*, *Fasting*, and *Almsgiving* during this time...

#### PRAYER:

- ♣ Attend as many of the services as possible and be strengthened in community prayer.
- ♣ Come to the Mystery of Confession (offered afte every service, on most Saturdays during the Grea Fast, or by appointment).
- ♣ Approach the Chalice to receive the Holy Eucharis as often as possible.
- Also, add additional prayers to your persona Prayer Rule at home. (See the attached abou reading the Book of Psalms during Great Lent.)

#### **FASTING:**

★ The Great Fast begins tomorrow, March 8. This is a day of strict fasting (no meat or dairy products)
Likewise, strict fast on Great & Holy Friday (4/22 and Great & Holy Saturday (4/23)

- ♣ The tradition of the Orthodox Church is a strict fast (no meat or dairy products eaten) by all of the faithful for the entire 40 days of the Great Fast and for all of Holy Week.
- ★ If you cannot physically do this, adopt a fasting rule
  and stick to it for the duration of the Great Fast (see
  Father for some guidance). Here are a few
  examples:
- o a) strict fast on certain days of the week while keeping a meat fast on the others;
- o b) fast only from meat;
- o c) fast from meat for certain weeks (Clean Week, Cross Week, and Holy Week); or
- o d) fast from meat on Wednesdays, Fridays, and all of Holy Week (April 18-23).
- ▼ The more effort you put forth in your fasting, the more spiritually uplifting your Lenten Season will be!
- \*A minimum three (3) hour fast from all food and drink for those receiving Communion at the evening Pre-sanctified Liturgy (the regular "midnight Fast" is called for the Liturgies of St. John Chrysostom & St. Basil the Great)
- ♣ The sick and infirm are not bound by the fast at any time
- ♣ Those requiring medications or certain prescribed diets are to follow their physician's instructions.
- ♣ Lastly, the Great Fast is not a "40 day diet program" or simply a "dietary adjustment" (or "label Lent").



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## Being an Orthodox Christian

The Orthodox Church is not just another organization, club or fraternal society. It is the Body of Christ, and a life-giving relationship with God. The Orthodox Church is a continuation of the Christian Church from the time of Christ until the present. As Orthodox Christians, we do not have a relationship with Christ in isolation, but alongside other Orthodox Christians. With these things in mind, Orthodox Christians are expected to:

- ♣ Strive daily to live a Christian life, according to the teachings of Our Lord in the Gospels, and the tradition of the Church.
- ₱ Regularly participate in the Divine Liturgy on Sundays (and on holy days as permitted by your employment).
  - Those who are homebound and/or physically unable to attend services on a regular basis are asked to spiritually join in prayer on Sundays and holy days. The priest will visit with the Sacraments periodically throughout the year, as requested.
- ♣ Regularly receive Holy Communion and participate in the Mystery of Holy Confession. (The minimum is no less than once a year for each, but at least four times a year is better.)
- ♥ Offer your whole life to Christ, and offer the "Three T's" time, talent and treasure to sustain the church (your stewardship).
- Participate in parish ministries and activities.
- Volunteer to help.
- o Give monetary support.
- Our parish does not survive on stewardship, we 'thrive' on this form of voluntary giving of who we are. If we are unable to donate monetarily,

there are many other ways to give with time and talents.

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## **FEAST DAY FEATURES OF THE MONTH**

# First (4 C.) & Second (452) Discovery Of The Head Of The Prophet, Forerunner And Baptist John

Commemorated on March 9 / February 24

After the cutting off of the Head of the Prophet ForeRunner and Baptist John (Comm. 29 August), hi body was buried by disciples in the Samarian city o Sebasteia, and the venerable head was hidden by Herodias in an unclean place. Pious Joanna, wife o king Herod's steward Chuza (there is made mention about him by the holy evangelist Luke – Lk 8: 3) secretly took the holy head and placed it into a vesse

and buried it on the Mount of Olives – in one of the properties of Herod. After many years this property passed into the possession of the dignitary Innocentius, who began to build a church there. When they dug a trench for the foundation, the vessel with the venerable head of John the Baptist was uncovered. Innocentius recognised the great holiness of it from the signs of grace occurring from it. Thus occurred the First Discovery of the Head. Innocentius preserved it with great piety, but before his own death, fearful so that the holy relic should not be abused by unbelievers, he again hid it in that same place, where it was found...Upon his death the church fell into ruin and was destroyed.

During the days of Equal-to-the-Apostles Constantine the Great (+ 337, Comm. 21 May), when the Christian faith began to flourish, the holy ForeRunner himself appeared twice unto two monks journeying to Jerusalem on pilgrimage to the holy places, and he revealed the location of his venerable head. The monks uncovered the holy relic and, placing it into a sack of camel-hair, they proceeded homewards. Along the way they encountered an unnamed potter and gave him to carry the precious burden. Not knowing what he was carrying, the potter continued on his way. But the holy ForeRunner himself appeared to him and ordered him to flee from the careless and lazy monks, together with that which was in his hands. The potter concealed himself from the monks and at home he preserved the venerable head with reverence. Before his death he sealed it into a water-carrying vessel and gave it over to his sister. From that time the venerable head was successively preserved by pious christians, until the priest Eustathios infected with the Arian heresy – came into possession of it. He seduced a multitude of the infirm. healed by the holy head, adding abundance to the heresy. When his blasphemy was uncovered, he was compelled to flee. Having buried the holy relic in a cave, near Emessus, the heretic intended to afterwards return and again take possession of it for disseminating falsehood. But God did not permit this. Pious monks settled into the cave, and then at this place arose a monastery. In the year 452 Saint John the Baptist in a vision to the archimandrite of this monastery Marcellus indicated the place of concealment of his head. This became celebrated as the Second Discovery. The holy relic was transferred to Emessus, and later to Constantinople.

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## SPIRITUAL CONSIDERATIONS

Father is available to meet Monday thru Friday from 8:30am to 3:00pm or by appointment.

*Online Community*: Please email Fr. Dave to receive the weekly bulletin via email.

**Parish Phone Tree** - Please call Fr. Dave to be added. **Emergency Sick Calls** - Please notify Fr Dave when you or a family member are going into the hospital or having a procedure. He will pray with you and you will receive the Mystery of Holy Anointing (Unction) to be fully prepared.

Mystery of Confession – Opportunities are available after every service, most Saturdays during fasting periods from 11am to 1pm, OR by appointment.

*Holy Communion/Eucharist* – The reception of the Holy Eucharist is encouraged for all Orthodox Christians who have properly prepared themselves, with fasting from midnight on, regular Confession, and forgiveness for all people. Those who are not Orthodox may receive *a blessing* from the chalice.

Lapsed Members – You are always welcome home and we want you back! Generally speaking, sincere participation in the Mysteries of Confession, Communion, and regular attendance at the divine services are all that is required to begin parish life anew! See Fr. Dave for specific details.

Parishioners in "good standing" are those Orthodox Christians who, as members of Saint John's Orthodox Church, strive to live according to the teachings of the Orthodox Church; participate in the life of the parish through regular attendance of services, regular reception of Holy Communion and periodic Holy Confession (and receive these Mysteries no less than once a year); if married, having been married in the Orthodox Church; and share their stewardship of their time, talents, and treasures which includes financially supporting the parish.

**Baptisms** – Two God-parents are required, at least one of whom must be Orthodox by faith (and the other a practicing Christian). In the case of infants, the newly-baptized must have one name that is Christian in origin. Parents/grandparents/guardians must also promise to bring the child up in an Orthodox Christian way of life. Please consult Fr. Dave for more details.

Adult Chrismation – New parishioners are alway welcome! In the case of adults seeking entrance into the Church, a period of prescribed catechism will be established with Fr. Dave before administration of the Mysteries. An Orthodox Christian sponsor is also required.

*Marriages* – are only solemnized on Saturdays o Sundays in the church. They are <u>not</u> performed during fasting periods and certain Feast Days. Please consul Fr. Dave ASAP for more details (*before* arrangement are made for the hall). It is critical that marriages are blessed in the church.

**Church Funerals** – are provided for practicing Orthodox Christians who are current in their spiritua responsibilities and their stewardship. Otherwise burial is from the funeral home. The Church does no permit cremation.

"The cremation of bodies is not a Christian act. It is a custom of modern times. The body of a Christian has been sanctified with the Grace of the Holy Spirit, and as such may not be burned. God did not create our
