SUNDAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS

Epistle: Philippians 4:4-9

⁴Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. ⁵Let all men know your forbearance. The Lord is at hand. ⁶ Have no anxiety about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. ⁷ And the peace of God, which passes all understanding, will keep your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

⁸ Finally, brethren, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is gracious, if there is any excellence, if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things. 9 What you have learned and received and heard and seen in me, do; and the God of peace will be with you.

Gospel: John 12:1-18

Mary Anoints Jesus

12 Six days before the Passover, Jesus came to Bethany, where Laz'arus was, whom Jesus had raised from the dead. ²There they made him a supper; Martha served, and Laz'arus was one of those at table with him. ³ Mary took a pound of costly ointment of pure spikenard and anointed the feet of Jesus and wiped his feet with her hair; and the house was filled with the fragrance of the ointment. ⁴But Judas Iscariot, one of his disciples (he who was to betray him), said, 5"Why was this ointment not sold for three hundred denarii [a day's wage] and given to the

poor?" ⁶This he said, not that he cared for the poor but because he was a thief, and as he had the money box he used to take what was put into it. ⁷ Jesus said, "Let her alone, let her keep it for the day of my burial. ⁸The poor you always have with you, but you do not always have me."

The Plot to Kill Lazarus

⁹When the great crowd of the Jews learned that he was there, they came, not only on account of Jesus but also to see Laz'arus, whom he had raised from the dead. ¹⁰ So the chief priests planned to put Laz'arus also to death, 11 because on account of him many of the Jews were going away and believing in Jesus.

Jesus' Triumphal Entry into Jerusalem

¹² The next day a great crowd who had come to the feast heard that Jesus was coming to Jerusalem. ¹³ So they took branches of palm trees and went out to meet him, crying, "Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord, even the King of Israel!" ¹⁴ And Jesus found a young ass and sat upon it; as it is written,

> ¹⁵ "Fear not, daughter of Zion; behold, your king is coming, sitting on an ass's colt!"

¹⁶His disciples did not understand this at first; but when Jesus was glorified, then they remembered that this had been written of him and had been done to him. ¹⁷ The crowd that had been with him when he called Laz'arus out of the tomb and raised him from the dead bore witness. ¹⁸The reason why the crowd went to meet him was that they heard he had done this sign.

BULLETIN BOARD ANNOUNCEMENTS

*** Great Lent 2025 – We have arrived to the holiest week in the Liturgical Calendar. A service will be offered every day this week. Remember the phrase: Salvation is Transformation. It's okay if you have never been to a service before – come and see! Here is this message one more time: A general guideline for the Great Fast is this: Try to do more than last year. This is an opportunity, not an obligation. May our journey to Pascha be a spiritually beautiful one together!

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** Fasting Before Holy Anointing – It is common around the world to fast prior to the Mystery of Holy Anointing (Unction). Please follow the minimum 3-hour fast as we do prior to the Liturgy of the Presanctified Gifts before coming to the Unction service on Holy Wednesday. We will have a pizza with the community afterwards (sponsored by the ACRY).

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** Red Eggs – The suggestion was made (last year) to hard boil red eggs for the parish during Holy Week after one of the services. In your cooking at home – please save any RED ONION peels or BEET skins for us to naturally dye the eggs.

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* Reading of the Psalms on Good Friday Evening and Holy Saturday Morning – Starting this year, faithful are asked to sign up and commit to reading the Psalms at the Tomb of our Lord. We will begin immediately after the Vespers Service and Burial Procession on Good

Friday, continue until 10 pm, then restart Holy Saturday morning at 8 am until the start of the Vesperal Liturgy (at 9:30 am). Shifts will be 20-minutes long. May these words from the Gospel of Matthew when Jesus prayed in Gethsemane inspire all of us: And he came to the disciples and found them sleeping; and he said to Peter, "So, could you not keep awake with me one hour? Watch and pray that you may not enter into temptation; the spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak." (Matthew 26:40-41)

*** Why Guard the Tomb? – An ancient tradition in the Orthodox Church is the Vigil at the tomb of Christ. After our Lord died on the Cross, Nicodemus and Joseph of Arimathea took the body of Jesus, bound it in linen cloths with spices and buried Him in a new tomb. Mary Magdalene and the other Mary sat opposite the tomb watching as their Lord was buried. The Church over the centuries has joined with these two women in keeping watch over Jesus' tomb.

The Vigil at Christ's tomb is our opportunity to help keep watch over the Lord's Body as He descends into hell to loosen the bonds of death. There is no better way to understand the death and resurrection of Jesus than to participate in the Vigil by His tomb.

A sign-up sheet to participate and read the Psalter (readings will be prepared and available for you) before the tomb is on the curator desk in the vestibule. Times are set up in 20-minute blocks. Do not pass up this wonderful opportunity and blessing.

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** <u>Pot-Luck Paschal Meal</u> — Our next community pot-luck meal will be following the services on Pascha. All families are encouraged to sign up and bring something to share.

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** <u>Blessing of Graves</u> – Our annual grave blessings at the N.S. cemeteries will be on **April 27**. We will celebrate a Panachida after Liturgy and then head to the North Side after the coffee social. *** If your loved ones are not at one of the two cemeteries on the North Side, please schedule a time with Fr. Dave to meet (if possible) before the Feast of Ascension.

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** <u>Panachida Offerings</u> — Reminder: Panachidas (Memorial Services for the Departed) <u>cannot</u> be served on the Major Feast Days of our Lord including Palm Sunday and Holy Pascha (as well as Lazarus Saturday).



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LIVING THE ORTHODOX FAITH



Why the Orthodox Bless Paschal Food from the bulletin of Holy Ghost Orthodox Church, Phoenixville, PA (1999)

One practice quite essential to the understanding of the Resurrection of Christ is the blessing of food. Unfortunately, many have, in recent years, either perverted the understanding of the underlying spiritual meaning of blessing of food, making it merely a "quaint old-world custom" or else having completely dropped the practice. The question of blessing foods at Pascha (or fruit or flowers or candles or water at other Feasts, for that matter) is a tradition we should retain primarily because it is a testimony to the spiritual reality itself which we are celebrating. Consider these following points:

We, As Orthodox, firmly believe that when Adam & Eve sinned and were cast out of Paradise, not only did mankind fall, but in fact, all creation with it. Not only was humanity thrown into the depths of sin, all creation was. Not only was mankind lowered into a life radically different from the world which God created, but likewise, all creation, too. We see very clearly in Scripture, especially in the letters of St Paul, that "While Christ thus became the new Adam, having come into this world as man in order to trample down that sin and death and corruption brought into the world by the old Adam, all creation becomes new creation." "Everything-mankind, animals, flowers, food-everything is thus part of this

new creation made possible by the glorious Resurrection of Christ. Our liturgical hymns point this out. On Holy Pascha, we directly refer to the participation of all creation in Christ's Resurrection, triumphantly singling that Christ has led everything "from death to life," "from earth to heaven.' This means that not only are people created anew by participating in the victory of Christ over death and corruption, but that all creation, including the very food we eat, participates in this world-wide renewal. Just as we ask Christ for His victorious blessings for ourselves, so we like-wise ask that this same blessing may be extended to every facet of this life.

We as Orthodox believe that just as man was radically changed from his original state as a result of the sin of Adam, so, too, was all creation. When we pray, when we bless ourselves, when we receive the Eucharist. we reaffirm constantly that we wish to be lifted up from this life of corruption and be "reinstated", so to speak. To that position which mankind held before the fall of Adam and Eve. So, too, when we bless things, we likewise express the real desire to return them to their original state, to consecrate them and return them to their real purpose as created by God. Certainly, when we bless food at Pascha, we have this reality in mind. This food is no longer "ordinary" food, which in fact, can lead to sinfulness when used Improperly (such as the sin of gluttony), 'but 18 now, rather, food which has been restored to its original purpose, its original meaning, its original "creation." The real tragedy of not having our food blessed at Pascha is that we are in fact denying the spiritual realities outlined above. We hear such things as "Sure it's a quaint old custom, but, after all, this 18 America." What a denial of the whole Christian life! Do not the Scriptures clearly state that we are citizens of heaven, of the Kingdom of God, first? And equally tragic Is the situation of having our food blessed for the wrong reasons — because baba used to; because it's "our way;" and the like. In true Christian spirit, there's no such thing as "our Way" or "their way;" there is only Christ's way. And when we are called to participate In His Resurrection — when all creation, in fact, is called — we must respond to that calling, lest we forsake the privilege of being called "Christians."

So, let's open ourselves and all creation to that great Feast of the re-incarnation of all things — Holy Pascha. Let's put the way of Christ before "our" way or "their" way. Let's realize that when we're asked to have things blessed, whether it be food, flowers, water, or whatever, that it is primarily an expression of a deeper spiritual conviction which all Christians must have in order to be really Christian.

A Prayer Of Repentance (Psalm 50/51)

Have mercy upon me, O God, according to Your great mercy; And according to the multitude of Your compassions, blot out my transgressions. Wash me thoroughly from my iniquity, And cleanse me from my sin. For I acknowledge my iniquity, And my sin is continually before me. Against You only have I sinned, And done this evil before You. That You might be justified in Your words, And prevail when You judge. For behold, I was conceived in iniquities, And in sins did my mother bear me.

For behold, You have loved truth; The hidden and secret things of Your wisdom You have made clear to me. You shall sprinkle me with hyssop, and I shall be made clean; You shall wash me and I shall be made whiter than snow. You shall make me to hear joy and gladness, The bones which have been humbled shall rejoice. Turn Your face away from my sins, And blot out all my iniquities.

Create a clean heart in me, O God, And renew a right spirit within me. Cast me not away from Your presence, And take not Your Holy Spirit from me. Restore to me the joy of Your salvation, And with Your governing Spirit establish me. I shall teach transgressors Your ways, And the ungodly shall turn back to You.

Deliver me from blood-guiltiness, O God, who are the God of my salvation, My tongue shall rejoice in Your righteousness. O Lord, You shall open my lips, And my mouth shall declare Your praise.

For if You had desired sacrifice, I would have given it; With whole burnt offerings You shall not be pleased. A sacrifice to God is a broken spirit, A heart that is broken and humbled God will not despise. Do good, O Lord, in Your good pleasure to Zion; And let the walls of Jerusalem be built Then shall You be pleased with a sacrifice of righteousness, with oblation and whole burnt offerings; Then shall they offer bullocks upon Your altar.

THE PRAYER OF SAINT EPHRAIM THE SYRIAN

(in the Ruthenian tradition)

O Lord and Master of my life, take from me the spirit of laziness, despair, lust for power, and vain talking. + [Prostration]

But give to me, Your servant, the spirit of purity, humility, patience, and love. + [Prostration]

Yes, Lord and King, grant me to see my own sins, and not judge my brother, for blessed are You forever and ever. Amen. + [Prostration]

The following triplet is recited 4 times (making a total of 12 bows):

O God, be merciful to me, a sinner. [bow]

O God, cleanse me of my sins and have mercy on me. [bow]

O Lord, forgive me, for my sins are many. [bow] Then the prayer again with only one prostration: O Lord and Master of my life, take from me the spirit of laziness, despair, lust for power, and vain talking. But give to me, Your servant, the spirit of purity, humility, patience, and love. Yes, Lord and King, grant me to see my own sins, and not judge my brother, for blessed are You forever and ever. Amen. + [Prostration]

ONLINE BONUSES



Assembling A Traditional Easter Basket

One begins with a straw basket filling with foods each holding symbolic significance:

1. Easter Bread (Pascha)

A sweet yeast bread rich in eggs and butter, symbolic of Christ "the Living Bread". Usually a round loaf with a golden crust and decorated with a braid and cross. Pascha comes from the word Pasch, meaning

Passover. In English we use it to refer to the Easter season. In Slavonic the word paska is used to refer to Christ "the new lamb".

2. Cheese (Rusyn: Hrudka or Sirec)

A special cheese made from egg and milk shaped into a ball having a rather bland but sweet taste indicative of the moderation that Christians should have in all things. It is often decorated with cloves in the form of a cross.

3. Ham (Šunka)

The meat popular with the Slavs as the main dish because of its richness and symbolism of the great joy and abundance of Easter. Some may prefer lamb or veal.

4. Sausage (Kolbasi)

A spicy pork product flavored with garlic, indicative of God's favor and generosity.

5. Butter (Maslo)

This favorite dairy product is often shaped into a lamb or small cross. Symbolic of Christ the lamb who was offered upon the altar of the Cross for the life of the world.

6. Bacon (Slanina)

Uncooked bacon cured with spices. Symbolic of the overabundance of God's mercy to us.

7. Salt (Sol)

Symbolizes the Truth of the message of Christ. Just as salt preserves food, so the teaching of Christ preserves our eternal life.

8. Horseradish (Chrin)

Horseradish mixed with grated red beets. Symbolic of the Passion of Christ still in our minds but sweetened with some sugar because of the Resurrection. A bittersweet red colored mixture reminds us of the sufferings of Christ.


9. Decorated Eggs (Pysankŷ)

Hard boiled eggs brightly decorated with symbols and markings made with beeswax. Eggs were always considered as symbols of the resurrection, the emergence of new life.

*** We are not limited to only having these items in our basket (nor do we have to have all of them). We fast for 40 days and a tradition is to bring what you

have fasted from to the church to bless it before having some again (i.e. chocolate, or gum, or pop, or beer, etc.)





A Note About The Mystery Of Confession

Confessions will be heard in front of the Icon of Christ. Confessions will be heard following every service, on most Saturdays during Great Lent from 11am – 1pm, and at other times by appointment (please contact Fr. Dave to arrange this). If you have a regular Spiritual Father, or wish to go to another Orthodox priest to have your confession heard, no problem! but please let Fr. Dave know. Do not wait to plan for your confession! Confessions before Pascha will only be heard through Holy Wednesday.

++++++++ SUGGESTED GUIDELINES FOR THE GREAT FAST (GREAT LENT):

We are called to increase our *Prayer*, *Fasting*, *and Almsgiving* during this time...

PRAYER:

- ♣ Attend as many of the services as possible and be strengthened in community prayer.
- ▼ Come to the Mystery of Confession (offered after every service, on most Saturdays during the Great Fast, or by appointment).
- ▼ Approach the Chalice to receive the Holy Eucharist as often as possible.
- ♥ Also, add additional prayers to your personal *Prayer Rule* at home. (See the attached about reading the Book of Psalms during Great Lent.)

FASTING:

★ The Great Fast begins tomorrow, March 3. This is a day of strict fasting (no meat or dairy products). Likewise, strict fast on Great & Holy Friday (4/18) and Great & Holy Saturday (4/19)

- ♣ The tradition of the Orthodox Church is a strict fast (no meat or dairy products eaten) by all of the faithful for the entire 40 days of the Great Fast and for all of Holy Week.
- ♣ If you cannot physically do this, adopt a fasting rule and stick to it for the duration of the Great Fast (see Father for some guidance). Here are a few examples:
- o a) strict fast on certain days of the week while keeping a meat fast on the others;
- o b) fast only from meat;
- o c) fast from meat for certain weeks (Clean Week, Cross Week, and Holy Week); or
- o d) fast from meat on Wednesdays, Fridays, and all of Holy Week (*April 18-23*).
- ♣ The more effort you put forth in your fasting, the more spiritually uplifting your Lenten Season will be!
- A minimum three (3) hour fast from all food and drink for those receiving Communion at the evening Pre-sanctified Liturgy (the regular "midnight Fast" is called for the Liturgies of St. John Chrysostom & St. Basil the Great)
- ▼ The sick and infirm are not bound by the fast at any time.
- ♣ Those requiring medications or certain prescribed diets are to follow their physician's instructions.
- ♣ Lastly, the Great Fast is not a "40 day diet program" or simply a "dietary adjustment" (or "label Lent").

ALMSGIVING:

Find a way to give more of your time, talent, and treasures – give more of yourself to others. + + +

A general guideline for the Great Fast is this: *Try to do more than last year.*

Please reach out if you have questions about this important fasting period that we are blessed with. This is an opportunity, not an obligation. May our journey to Pascha be a spiritually beautiful one! -Fr. Dave

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LIVES OF THE SAINTS

Sainted Innocent, Metropolitan Of Moscow And Kolomensk

Commemorated on April 13/March 31

Sainted Innocent (Innokentii) (Veniaminov), Metropolitan of Moscow and Kolomensk (26 August 1797 - 31 March 1879), was glorified in canonisation by the Russian Orthodox Church on 6 October 1977. He was born in the village of Anginsk in the Irkutsk diocese. The Apostle of America and Siberia bespoke his good-news "even to the ends of the earth": in the Aleutian islands (from 1823), in the six dialects of the local tribes on the island of Sitka (from 1834), amongst the Kolosh (Tlingit); in the remotest settlements of the extensive Kamchatka diocese (from 1853); amidst the Koryak, Chukchei, Tungus in the Yakutsk region (from 1853) and North America (in 1857); in the Amur and Usuriisk region (from 1860).

Having spent a large part of his life in journeys, Saint Innocent translated into the Aleutian language a Catechism and the Gospel, and in 1833 he wrote in this language one of the finest works of Orthodox missionary activity – "A Directive of the Way to the Kingdom of Heaven". In 1859 the Yakut first heard the Word of God and Divine-services in their own native language. Twice (in 1860 and 1861) Sainted Innocent met with the Apostle to Japan – Sainted Nikolai (Comm. 3 February), sharing with him his spiritual experience.

A remarkable preacher, Sainted Innocent said: "Exactly that, whosoever aboundeth in faith and love, can have mouth and wisdom, and the heart cannot resist their serving it".

Having begun apostolic work as a parish priest, Saint Innocent closed with it upon the cathedra of Moscow First-Hierarchs (5 January 1868 - 31 March 1879). He was devoted to the Will of God during all the course of his life, and he left behind a testimonial of faith to his successors decreed in the words of the prophet: "From the Lord are the footsteps of man directed" (Ps. 36: 23). The memory of Saint Innocent is celebrated twice during the year: on 23 September (6 October) and on 31 March (13 April).

How can we live with the framework of being a caretaker of the blessings God gives us?

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Why Should I Join the Local ACRY?

The ACRY is an Orthodox Christian family fellowship dedicated to the purpose of encouraging spiritual growth through charitable and apostolic missionary works, prayer and fellowship for the Glory of God and the building up of the Church and our Diocese. Mystery of Confession – Opportunities are available after every service, most Saturdays during fasting periods from 11am to 1pm, OR by appointment.

Holy Communion/Eucharist – The reception of the Holy Eucharist is encouraged for all Orthodox Christians who have properly prepared themselves, with fasting from midnight on, regular Confession, and forgiveness for all people. Those who are not prepared or not of the Orthodox Faith may receive a blessing from the chalice.

How to receive - Please remember the following helpful hints aimed at helping to preserve the solemnity and safety of the Holy Mystery. Anyone wearing lipstick should remove it before receiving. Be sure to offer your baptismal name to the priest before receiving. Please take great care that the red cloth held by the acolytes (servers) is fully under your chin (you should not hold it), then use the centuries-old practice of receiving: please fully open your mouth, tilt your head back, receive the Holy Gifts, wait until They are securely in your mouth and so that none of the holy and precious Body and Blood of Christ is accidentally spilled. Thank you for your cooperation, and may God have mercy on us all!

Lapsed Members — You are always welcome home and we want you to come back! Generally speaking, sincere and regular participation in the Sunday Divine Liturgy and in the Mysteries of Confession and Communion are all that is required to begin parish life anew! See Fr. Dave for specific details.

Parishioners in "good standing" are those Orthodox Christians who, as members of Saint John's Orthodox Church, strive to live according to the teachings of the Orthodox Church; participate in the life of the parish

through regular attendance of services, regular reception of Holy Communion and periodic Holy Confession (and receive these Mysteries no less than once a year); if married, having been married in the Orthodox Church; and share their stewardship of their time, talents, and treasures which includes financially supporting the parish.

Baptisms – Two God-parents are required, at least one of whom must be Orthodox by faith (and the other a practicing Christian). In the case of infants, the newly-baptized must have one name that is Christian in origin. Parents/grandparents/guardians must also promise to bring the child up in an Orthodox Christian way of life. Please consult Fr. Dave for more details.

Adult Chrismation – New parishioners are always welcome! In the case of adults seeking entrance into the Church, a period of prescribed catechism will be established with Fr. Dave before administration of the Mysteries. An Orthodox Christian sponsor is also required.

Marriages – are only solemnized on Saturdays or Sundays in the church. They are <u>not</u> performed during fasting periods and certain Feast Days. Please consult Fr. Dave ASAP for more details (*before* arrangements are made for the hall). It is critical that marriages are blessed in the church.

Church Funerals – are provided for practicing Orthodox Christians who are current in their spiritual responsibilities and their stewardship. Otherwise, burial is from the funeral home. The Church does not permit cremation.

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"The cremation of bodies is not a Christian act. It is a custom of modern times. The body of a Christian has been sanctified with the Grace of the Holy Spirit, and as such may not be burned. God did not create our bodies for burning." - Elder Thaddeus of Vitovnica
